

TDET launches brand new digital strategy

This term, we have been working on the new TDET Digital Strategy. This is a really exciting piece of work that links our Trust strategic plan and digital projects together. The Digital Strategy hopes to maximise the potential of digital technology to enhance learning, systems and communication and to support the aims and aspirations of TDET.

The Digital Strategy is not about looking at digital projects in isolation but making sure that our digital tools work together to give the best digital answers for everyone in the Trust. There are four key themes to the strategy to help us develop and structure our digital future:



The strategy is being led by a steering group including Jenny Brassington, Simon Smith, Scott Hudson, Martin Byford-Rew, Steve Howard and Jane Wilson.

The team has already completed an audit with schools to evaluate how well TDET is currently meeting the key objectives and has begun working on some big projects, including an exciting 1:1 iPad learning and teaching project for all Trust schools. They have also started working with teams across the Trust on other digital projects and developments. We look forward to seeing what the strategy continues to achieve in the future.

Success at TDA Mental Health Summit

This year, TDET and Thomas Deacon Academy have teamed up with Citizens UK to set up the Peterborough Citizens Alliance, as a result of funding through the Government's Integrated Communities Strategy. The Peterborough Citizens Alliance is now running a listening campaign to ascertain issues and areas for improvement within Peterborough.

As part of this campaign TDA Sixth Form pupils organised a Peterborough Digital Mental Health Summit. Twenty adults and sixty pupils from across eight schools in Peterborough, attended the Mental Health Summit to identify barriers young people encounter when getting support for their mental health.

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The event was fantastic and facilitated lots of really important discussions around mental health and the services available to young people in Peterborough. The session also included some incredible pupil testimonies and participants heard from several guest speakers, including Paul Bristow MP, Lydia Crawford from The Mix helpline, and Dr Amaia Robles-Fernandez from the NHS Mental Health Support Team.

As a result of the Summit, pupils have managed to secure a meeting with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group and have set up a Peterborough-wide mental health action group.

What we've learned from Covid

While it has been a difficult year for so many of us, this year has also brought with it a wealth of innovation and a chance to try something new. We caught up with members of staff from across the Trust to find out their take-aways from this time and the things they'd like to keep moving forward.

"I would like to maintain the level of personalised communication between our school and our families. Distributing FSM vouchers, food packages and care phone calls home are among other school – home communication opportunities which have enormously enhanced the feeling of community."

"I think one of the biggest things for us was developing our online tearning opportunities for pupils very quickly. We now set homework online where in the past we would send out paper copies. It is an area we are tooking into further."

"Although there is a potential danger of 'screen fatigue', the new wave of Zoom/Teams CPD events allows for an opportunity to digest professional learning in ways previously not accessible."

"What I have really enjoyed about this time is the bubble system. I think generally the pupils are more focussed. Also, I'm finding most of my pupils more committed to learning and appreciating the school experience more"

"I think the use of Teams for both remote meetings and supporting pupils who are isolating has been really beneficial. It has had a positive impact on my work life balance as it takes out travelling time."

"Our year groups having playtimes together and with the same members of staff who support them during the day has meant that pupils are able to build even better relationships with those adults and peers within their year groups. The adults are able to support the pupils during playtimes, organise games that they know they will respond well to and identify quickly where any child might be struggling with friendships."

"I would like to keep the courage we developed to let go of things and say no!"

"I learned that our staff are highly resilient and able to pick up and run with any restrictions that are placed upon them as a result of the pandemic."

"Staggered starts have led to a calm start for all children, as they come straight into the building in their time slot. This has meant that pupils are ready to learn as soon as they come into school."

"The Learning platform that we developed and used to engage with our families has significantly enhanced communication and relationships are stronger as a result of this."

"We have Learned that nothing is impossible. Human beings can show incredible creativity, innovation and resilience in the face of adversity when they are focused on the right priorities and led by their hearts. We put the children at the heart of what we were doing and then surprised ourselves with what we achieved."

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Our People



Amy Warboys – Head of School at Upwood Primary Academy

Can you tell us about your career history?

I started my teaching career as an NQT in Bedfordshire, before moving to Suffolk to teach in a small school. From there, I moved to Peterborough and started to develop my leadership skills within larger schools. While working with Simon Martin, I applied for a position as Deputy Headteacher at Gladstone Primary Academy which really accelerated my leadership development. In September, the opportunity arose for me to apply for a secondment at Upwood Primary Academy as Head of School, which I was successful in getting.

What does your current role include on a day-to-day basis?

Due to the current circumstances, my role is very varied, and I am often unaware of what my day will involve until I arrive at school! Mostly, it is discussing and sharing priorities so that our pupils are able to grow, learn and flourish. In my role, I also think it is important to get to know members of staff, children, and parents as well as possible and to strengthen links with the community. Every day I come to school, I try to achieve that in some way.

What is your vision for the school?

My immediate vision for the school is ensuring that all children remain safe, happy and ready to learn. At Upwood, we aim to create a caring, positive learning environment so that we can educate the next generation of informed citizens to make a difference in society. Long term, I would love to build further on this and increase the depth of the curriculum here.

Did you always want to become a Head?

I haven't always wanted to become a Head, but I always knew I wanted to be involved in education. I think once I developed my leadership skills, I realised that was what I wanted to do more of. I am always looking to progress and push myself, as well as help other people to improve and develop.

How do you feel the Trust has supported your development?

TDET has always believed in my potential, encouraged me to focus on myself and offered me leadership opportunities, such as coaching sessions with John Hinch. I think it is a privilege to have the chance to lead a school and I am really pleased the Trust could see that in me.

Fun fact:

I once did a parachute jump for the Penfold Trust charity! It was the most exhilarating, scary thing I have ever done but it was great to raise funds for a worthy cause.


Queen Katharine Academy

In November, Her Majesty's Inspector from the Health and Safety Executive visited Iqra Academy. The Health and Safety Executive carried out site inspections to identify if we were adequately managing the risks of Covid. We are thrilled to say that the HMI stated that he was very happy with the school's compliance to all the relevant regulations and guidance pertaining to Covid. He even made special reference to our Covid risk assessment, stating that, "It was good to see that it was not a common risk assessment and that it was professionally thorough and technical."

This term, we also welcomed Paul Bristow MP to Iqra Academy! Paul was very impressed with the school, stating: "Great visit to the Iqra Academy. Another Peterborough school thriving after the big return at the start of the month. It was great to hear about the sporting success of the school and the recent pupil elections. I met and heard about some exceptional young people including two Syrian refugees who have just excelled in their GSCEs"

We have also continued with much of our enrichment, health and wellbeing activities from art and poetry to cross country and the CCF. The new Student Leadership team continue to lead the way on fundraising and volunteer work and this term created and equipped a 'chill out – wellbeing room' a calm space in the school for all pupils to use.

Gladstone Primary Academy



This term, we were delighted to take home first, second, third and fourth place at the national languages competition, Primary Bee. So many of our pupils wanted to enter the competition, so we held a mini contest in school to select our contenders. Four Year 6 pupils were chosen, and they all did so well. Moshin won first place, followed by Ali in second, Kianaat in third and Maya in fourth!

This term, we also had our first experience of staff teaching virtually from home and we were so proud of how well our



staff and pupils embraced this. Mr Dobbs was our first live stream teacher and our pupils really enjoyed the experience. Our Power Steps group still did the alphabet chant, even when Miss Camara was at home isolating.



In November, we were excited to donate hand-drawn pictures to Gladstone Community Centre. They are now on display in the centre's communal areas and look fantastic. Well done to all of our pupils and staff who were involved.

As part of our Year 3 Enrichment Day this term, our pupils designed and created their own Stone Age tool or weapon out of card and paper. They then had to think about how they turned their 2D drawing into a 3D model. Well done Year 3, they looked great!

Thomas Deacon Academy

Earlier this term, 20 adults and 60 pupils from across eight schools in Peterborough, attended our virtual Mental Health Summit to identify barriers young people encounter when getting support for their mental health. Working with Citizens UK, our Sixth Form pupils ran the summit on Zoom.



The session also included some incredible pupil testimonies and we heard from several guest speakers including Paul Bristow Peterborough MP, Lydia Crawford from The Mix helpline, and Dr Amaia Robles-Fernandez from the NHS Mental Health Support Team. As a result of the summit, pupils managed to secure a meeting with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Clinical Commissioning Group and have set up a Peterborough-wide mental health action group!

Despite the many challenges Covid has thrown at us this year, we still managed to support Children in Need and raised £2,100. We were also able to go ahead with our annual Remembrance Day. The service was live streamed via YouTube and was broadcast to staff and pupils in their classrooms across the Trust at 10:45. Our Cadets were at the heart of the service and marched into the school carrying the wreath. At 11am, our staff and pupils stood to observe a two-minute silence, in memory of the fallen. It was a shame we couldn't host our service in person like normal, but it was an honour to still be able to acknowledge the courage and bravery of those who served in war.





The Cadets came together with the Art and Technology Department to create a lovely Garden of Remembrance. The Cadets worked hard to make 42 'Tommys' to represent the 42 ex Deacons pupils who were killed in battle during WW2.

We celebrated some fantastic artistic achievements this term. Last year, Eloise Leer entered the Rivers of the World art competition. Now in Year 7, Eloise's work have been chosen to feature as part of the Peterborough Young Artist entry! In November, our Year 13 Art pupils had the pleasure of welcoming alumni pupil, Sofia Ali, to the academy. She delivered a workshop on how to create a successful personal statement and how to build a great art portfolio to prepare for university applications.

Thomas Deacon Academy Juniors

This term, we felt it was really important to focus on our wellbeing and support was developed throughout the school through the 'Art of Brilliance' programme. This enabled all pupils and staff to return to school with the positivity and resilience to get through these difficult times.

As part of this, pupils watched online webinars and spent time discussing a range of topics. They discussed topics such as, being the best version of yourself, the importance of perspective and the science of flourishing. We found that having these opportunities and discussions really helped support our pupils' wellbeing.

We are also pleased to have supported two charity events this year! Year 6 supported Water Aid and raised over £100 by designing money boxes for pennies and holding a second-hand book sale. In addition to this, the whole school supported Children in Need.

Welbourne Primary Academy

This term, we were so lucky to receive a £3,000 donation from Kingsgate to purchase more digital devices! Thank you to Kingsgate for their help and generous support.

Our Year 1 pupils explored seasons in Science this term. As part of their learning, pupils got outdoors and spent time looking for signs of Autumn. They found a really big one in the form of a ginormous tree! Meanwhile our Galaxy Room pupils celebrated Halloween festivities. They made Halloween moon sand, completed a spooky scavenger hunt in the woods and tried to eat Halloween donuts without using their hands!





We also worked in PSHE to support our pupils with their mental health and wellbeing. Pupils in Year 4 discussed how to cope in new situations. They made comic strips illustrating some of the new situations they have faced and created their own board games demonstrating positive ways to handle difficulty.

This term, we introduced a new initiative - Mini Cadets! Supported by TDET, our Year 5 and 6 pupils began their Mini Cadets training and have recently been learning what to do if someone is unconscious. We can't wait to watch them progress!

In other news, our Year 4 pupils learnt about the ocean as part of their topic Blue Abyss and created 3D models of the layers of the ocean. Meanwhile, as part of the Rocket Room home challenge, Charlie made a fabulous sea monster!

Warboys Primary Academy

This term, our whole school has engaged with and implemented the Recovery Curriculum, published by One Education. The curriculum has supported children's social and emotional wellbeing and ensured they made the most of their time in school by being confident, resilient and ready to learn in the classroom again.

We took part in Anti-Bullying Week and pupils made friendship bracelets for their friends. We also marked the occasion by coming into school wearing odd socks to show our individuality. Our focus was on what forms bullying can take, what children can do if they see others being bullied and ways to respond if it happens to them.





This year we also launched a healthy snack initiative so our pupils could benefit from a nutritious treat on a daily basis. The Government funded the fruit scheme for children in KS1 and we asked KS2 children to only bring snacks to school that align with what the Government provide KS1. It was great to see how creative and adventurous the children were with their healthy choices!

We were fortunate this year to have had specialist support and investment from the Trust, enabling us to carry out important work to improve our premises. KS1 are reaping the benefits of their new and improved classrooms, and the wider footpath around school has certainly made movement around the site much easier. In addition to this, ICT Services also installed fifteen new internet telephones, eighteen new laptops and thirteen new interactive whiteboards.
