

Coronavirus: How our schools have adapted

Over the last few months, the education system has undergone a change unlike anything before. In this time we have been incredibly proud of how our colleagues have continued to support each other and adapted to keep providing a high-quality education for all our pupils. Here are some highlights of the great practices our academies have implemented to keep connected with each other and support our communities:



Our People

Can you tell us about your career history?

"I started working in the education sector in 1997 as a Learning Support Assistant at Walton Community College. I became interested in the role of Education Welfare Officers (as they were known then) and I joined Cambridgeshire County Council in 2001. I moved to Peterborough City Council in 2006 as an Attendance Officer and in 2007, I began working with The Voyager School. I became a full-time member of The Voyager Academy team in 2013 and have continued in my role as Attendance Manager ever since."

What is your role and what are you responsible for?

"Attendance plays a crucial part in a pupil's development and success. There are almost always reasons why children struggle to attend school and in my role I try to get a whole picture of a pupil's life to see if there is anything we can to give them extra support. I meet with all the pupil support officers every week to look at pupils with attendance concerns and often speak directly with pupils and their parents to see if there are any issues we can support them with to improve their attendance.

From this, I try to find solutions to their problems where I can, from liaising with housing officers to applying for transport support. I also manage holiday applications, looking at reasons for the request and requesting fines from the local authority if required. Being local authority trained is really helpful in my role as I know how the process works from start to finish and how multi-agency support can provide the best help for pupils."

What is the most rewarding part of your role?

"My favourite part of my role is always seeing the end result after we've helped our families. Our pupils come from all over the city, with some having to catch two buses every morning to get to school. For those families, getting a bus pass or getting housing assistance can make a huge difference to their lives. It is inspiring to see pupils succeed in Year 11 that we have supported in Year 7. It's rewarding to know I've been a little link in the chain that's helped them to get to that point. I am also lucky to have great support from my work colleagues at Queen Katharine Academy to enable me to fulfil my role."

What are your experiences of working within a Trust?

"I have really enjoyed having the opportunity to support other schools as part of the Trust and I have worked closely with Thomas Deacon Academy. Ultimately, it's really nice to know that we've got the backing from the Trust and that the Trust has faith in our school. It has been fantastic to see the academy progress under the Trust's support."

Animals in School

Research has shown that having animals in school can give pupils a sense of responsibility. It can help develop their emotional and social skills as they build the ability to be empathetic, caring and committed, while providing a unique interaction for pupils who may not be able to have a pet at home.

Charities, such as the Blue Cross for Pets, believe having a pet in school supports children's learning, particularly reading, speaking and observation. This is felt to be especially the case for pupils with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). Animals can also support behaviour as children find comfort in petting them and they can be used as a reward for positive actions. It's no surprise then that many of our academies have school pets or often have animals come in for the day.

Treacle at Warboys

Pupils and staff at Warboys Primary Academy welcomed Treacle the cocker spaniel as their new school dog earlier this year. Treacle loved her welcome letters, poems and pictures created by the children.

Treacle now provides lots of fun learning opportunities for pupils as they discover how to play, pet and walk her as well as offering comfort. Treacle enjoys long walks and fetching tennis balls! It is great to see pupils interacting so well with her and taking on this new responsibility.

Welbourne Primary Academy have had guinea pigs at school for a while, and currently have Oreo and Rolo for the pupils to look after! They have their own courtyard in the centre of the school and pupils enjoy observing them and their behaviours.

Can you tell us a little bit about your career history?

"I joined Welbourne Primary Academy in November 2009 as a Teaching Assistant and I have held quite a few different roles in the school. My current role is Computing Lead. Before having twins, I worked at Pearl Assurance as an Accounting Technician and I saw lots of changes to the technology we used. I remember the first time I used Excel and Word and was amazed by the size of the main frame computer filling a whole room. I think that was the start of my interest in computing."

What is your role and what things do you get up to?

"I lead the teaching of Computing across the whole school, from Reception to Year 6. We teach programming right down into Reception by showing pupils how to make their own algorithm using heads, shoulders, knees and toes. Year 6 tend to use software such as Scratch, writing their own programs and debugging them. I am also involved in the school library and getting pupils involved in the running of it."

What is your favourite part of your role?

"Being there for the children is the most important thing. I am passionate about supporting them to be the best they can be and giving them great experiences while they are at school. Giving them a good start now will equip them for the future, especially as technology becomes increasingly essential to our society."

Welbourne joined TDET last year, how have you found being part of a Trust?

"I have worked closely with the TDET IT services and they have been fantastic. Martin Byford-Rew and his team have been so supportive throughout our transition into the Trust, from changing our website to migrating us onto Office 365. I really appreciate that there is always someone you can ask for help from other academies. We have we have recently set up a computing subject leads group which has been so useful already."

What are you most looking forward to in the next academic year?

"I am very passionate about Internet Safety and enjoy working hard to make our Safer Internet Day bigger and better every year. I am hoping to start a coding club soon, creating even more opportunities for our pupils to develop their skills. I am also hoping to introduce a mentor scheme that helps us to inspire our young girls to consider a career in STEM."

Richard Barnes Academy Update

We are delighted to announce that as of 1st May 2020, the Peterborough Pupil Referral Unit (PRU) officially joined the Thomas Deacon Education Trust.

The PRU provides specialist primary and secondary education for pupils in the city, aged between 4-16, who have been permanently excluded from school, or who are at risk of permanent exclusion. The aim of the provision is to successfully integrate as many of these pupils as possible back into mainstream education.

Most pupils who use the service have behavioural, social and emotional difficulties and the PRU works closely with pupils, parents, schools and other support services to help them return to school.

After receiving an Inadequate Ofsted rating in May 2019, the council service has embarked on a rapid journey of transformation and chose to join TDET as part of this plan.

We are delighted that Olive Academies were invited by the Department for Education to support us on this new project and it marks the first time two multi-academy trusts have worked together to launch an alternative provision academy. Olive Academies will be sharing their expertise in alternative provision and experience of working with excluded children with us for the first two years.

So far, Olive Academies has worked with us to develop an inspiring, specialist curriculum based on purposeful, active learning; a curriculum which will engage pupils and meet their individual needs. They will be supporting staff over the next two years, helping them to deliver the best support possible to the children and young people at their academy.

We are dedicated to supporting all staff, teachers, and leaders at the service to help improve the provision and make it one the city can be proud of.

To mark this transition and a new chapter for the PRU, the service has been rebranded and

relaunched as an academy specialising in alternative provision for children and young people for whom traditional teaching methods have not worked. The academy is now known collectively as Richard Barnes Academy (RBA) in honour of TDET's Chair of the Board of Trustees and the two campuses have been renamed the Fitzwilliam and Trinity Campuses.

RBA will benefit from working with our expert and knowledgeable team across the Trust and have access to a range of central education and business services to support them.

RBA is truly a great fit for TDET and our values of Trust, Diversity, Excellence and Transformation. We are looking forward to working closely with staff and pupils at the service and it will be a great opportunity for all our schools, staff, and pupils across the Trust to benefit from the sharing of best practice and innovative teaching techniques.

We will work together to create an academy that offers enriching experiences for young people struggling to succeed with their education, using highly creative ways of teaching that will encourage pupils to develop the confidence, skill and knowledge to believe they can lead successful lives and make a positive contribution to society.

We hope you will join us in giving them a warm welcome to the Trust!

Where are you joining RBA from and what experience do you bring to the role?

"I joined Richard Barnes Academy from TBAP multi-academy trust, which supports learners who are experiencing difficulty with or have been excluded from mainstream education. I headed up TBAP's East hub of four schools. Prior to that I worked in mainstream education for 12 or 13 years, starting as a PE teacher and working my way up to Assistant Principal with responsibility for Inclusion. I have always been passionate about inclusion and supporting learners who have had tricky starts to come out with the good qualifications and skills they need to make positive steps forward with their lives."

What is your vision for RBA?

"My vision for RBA is centred around the academy becoming a really excellent alternative provision, which leaves no stone unturned and is a beacon for exemplary practice in the alternative provision sector. My expectation is that all learners will come out with at least 5 GCSE qualifications or equivalent. I know it will take lots of hard work to get there but I am excited to work with our community, from parents, pupils, colleagues, the Trust and the local authority to make this happen."

What are you most excited about in your new role?

"The role of Principal at RBA is an exciting opportunity to create something new and fantastic. I am delighted with the senior team I have appointed and I know they will help me to drive our strategic approach forward and make RBA the best it can be."

How have you found being part of TDET?

"TDET is a brilliant Trust and was a large part of the reason I applied for the role. Dedication to inclusion runs through everyone at TDET and together, I know we can create a centre of excellence for young people who need extra support. I have really enjoyed working with the facilities and health and safety leads to prepare to reopen our sites during the lockdown and cannot thank them enough for the support they have given."

School Updates

Thomas Deacon Academy

Warboys Primary Academy


